UNITED KINGDOM

In view of the additional information supplied by the United Kingdom, the United Kingdom replies to questions 1 (d) and 4 (d) of the United Nations request for information contained in document E/CONF.6/9 should read as follows: 1/

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Question 1 (d)

Governments are invited to supply the Secretary-General with any relevant treaties, conventions or other international instruments to which they are parties;

Reply:

Question 4 (d)

Governments are invited to provide information concerning differences, if any, between transmission rates and services available to domestic and foreign news agencies and personnel;

Reply:

"50. There are no special transmission rates or services for news agencies or personnel in the international postal or telephone services. Reduced rates for international press telegrams are prescribed in the International Telegraph Regulations (Cairo) 1938, to which the United Kingdom is a party. These special international press telegrams rates are available to news agencies and personnel operating within the United Kingdom, both domestic and foreign, without distinction.

"All the United Kingdom inland postal, telegraph and telephone services are available equally at the ordinary rates to domestic and foreign news agencies and personnel.

"Newspapers printed and published in the United Kingdom, British possessions or Protectorates and fulfilling certain conditions, are, if registered at the General Post Office, afforded privileges including transmission at the cheap newspaper rate of postage to any address within the United Kingdom and Eire; and to Canada and Newfoundland at the magazine rate. Facilities are also given for despatch by early morning mails etc. of post copies if paid at the appropriate rate.

"As a result of the Universal Postal Convention of 1947, newspapers registered at the General Post Office and certain newspapers printed and published in the United Kingdom which fulfil conditions less exacting than those required for registration, are eligible for transmission to any destination abroad at a reduced rate of postage applicable to certain classes of printed appears within the international postal service.

"In the United Kingdom inland telegraph service, reduced press rates are available for the transmission of telegrams to newspapers, news agencies, clubs, exchange or news rooms, which are registered with the General Post Office. The ordinary inland telegraph tariff is applicable to telegrams addressed to newspapers etc. which are not so registered. Within the limits of availability of plant telegraph and telephone channels are placed at the exclusive disposal of renters. The tariff is based upon the technical characteristics of the channels provided without distinction as to the class of renter."
